Dr. Adiel Mbabu

Development consultant,

CAPDEV Consultants Limited

Dr.Adiel Mbabu is currently serving as a development consultant with CAPDEV Consultants Limited. He previously served as the Regional Director for the International Potato Center (CIP) in sub-Saharan Africa. In this position, he provided programmatic oversight

for research and development portfolio; provided leadership in regional operational systems; and played a representational role for CIP in sub-Saharan Africa (SSA).

Dr. Mbabu previously served as Manager for Reaching Agents of Change (RAC), a project co-hosted by CIP and Helen Keller International (HKI). The RAC project advocated for supportive policies and new investments by governments, donors and NGOs to scale-up adoption of Orange-Fleshed Sweet potato (OFSP) in selected countries. RAC also built capacity of implementing agencies to design and implement technically strong and cost-effective interventions to drive OFSP uptake. Countries of focus included Mozambique, Nigeria, Tanzania, and to a lesser extent Ghana and Burkina Faso.

Before joining CIP, he served as Senior Adviser – Agriculture Development (AusAID) and as Technical Director, Agricultural Research and Development Support Facility in Papua New Guinea (PNG). As Technical Director, Dr. Mbabu was engaged in supporting selected national agricultural research organizations to develop and implement results-based strategic plans, translating these plans into impact-oriented programs and projects and to build human and organizational capacity to deliver on the emerging portfolio. Under his role as Senior Adviser-Agriculture Development, he provided advice to AusAID, PNG Post and PNG government on potential areas of investment to meet national development objectives.

Dr. Mbabu also served as Senior Research Fellow for Organization and Management of Agricultural Research Program with the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI), ISNAR Division; Technical Officer, Program Planning at the Association for Strengthening Agricultural Research in East and Central Africa (ASARECA); as Planning, Management and Evaluation Adviser/interim Assistant Director - Socio-economics & Biometrics division, Kenya Agricultural Research Institute (KARI); as Research Fellow at the International Service for National Agricultural Research (ISNAR); and as Resident Scientist for the Small Ruminant Collaborative Research Support Programme (SR-CRSP), sociology project (Kenya site), on behalf of the University of Missouri-Columbia, in collaboration with the Kenya Agricultural Research Institute.



#### **Prof. Gideon Obare**

Agricultural economist, Director of Kenya's premier agricultural policy think tank at Tegemeo Institute of Agricultural Policy and Development, Egerton University

Professor Gideon Obare is distinguished agricultural economist, and at the Tegemeo Institute of Agricultural Policy and Development, is the director of Kenya's premier agricultural policy think tank at Egerton University. With over two decades of postdoctoral experience, he has built a formidable reputation for his leadership in policy research, advocacy, and capacity building to improve food security and rural livelihoods in East Africa, Professor Obare's academic journey spans a PhD in Agricultural Economics from Egerton University, a Master's degree from Kiel University in Germany, and a Bachelor's degree from the University of Nairobi, complemented by a postgraduate diploma from the University of Kassel. His expertise encompasses sustainable agricultural intensification, climate adaptation, and input markets, cooperative structures. and consumer preferences, strongly emphasising translating empirical research

into actionable policy solutions for smallholder farmers and rural communities.

Throughout his career, Professor Obare has demonstrated commitment international to collaboration. He has been a visiting fellow and professor at institutions such as ICRISAT, the University Hohenheim. and Tohoku University. He has led significant research initiatives, including the Adoption Pathways Project, and has published extensively in peerreviewed journals while presenting at numerous conferences. As a mentor, he has supervised dozens of graduate students who have gone on to influential roles in academia, government, and the private sector. Professor Obare's vision is rooted in the belief that rigorous research, effective policy engagement, and strong institutional leadership are essential for achieving sustainable development and food security in Africa, and his work continues in the region.

Karugia Joseph (PhD) is Scientist Principal at. the International Livestock Research Institute (ILRI), Nairobi, Kenya with expertise in agricultural economics and policy. He leads the Foresight and Policy team in the People, Policies and Institutions Program of ILRI. Joseph is also serving as the CGIAR Country Convener for Kenya. Prior to joining ILRI, Joseph was Research Manager at the African Economic Research Consortium (AERC), a premier economics research institution with mandate of building capacity in policy-oriented economic research in sub-Saharan Africa. He was a faculty member at the University of Nairobi for more than twentyeight years and served as Chairman of the Department of Agricultural Economics in 2002-2003. He has published scholarly numerous papers and is a member of several professional bodies. Agricultural & Livestock


